REMINDER FROM OUR ASSISTANT DIRECTOR

Harley Davidson - HOG Ride 365

Ride 365 is the official mileage recognition programme for the official riding club of Harley-Davidson (Originally called Chapter Challenge & Mileage rewards). Ride 365 includes the existing Lifetime Recognition and two new programmes – Annual Individual Recognition and Annual Chapter Challenge.

Who is eligible to participate in Ride 365? Any H.O.G. member can participate!

The Annual Recognition programme recognises miles ridden from January 1st to December 31st. Your miles will also be added to your lifetime total and tracked as part of the Lifetime Recognition programme.

What do you get if you qualify?? – Pins, patches, and certificates (subject to availability from HOG) are awarded to H.O.G. members for riding their Harley-Davidson motorcycles; awards begin at just 1,000 miles, with additional awards earned at 5,000, 10,000 and beyond and if you have more than one Harley Davidson, you can enter both.

*** At present there are patches and pins available but, in the USA, they have gone over to Digital Badges so no promises ***

What is required?

First name

Surname

Email address

H.O.G. number

Vin number of your Bike

You must attach a clear photo of your current odometer reading.

All entries must be with me NO LATER than the 7th of October 2024 and I will do my utmost to convince a dealership to enter them.

HEAD ROAD CAPTAIN





It's great to see our ride calendar is still bursting with rides, with 10 rides planned for October when many Chapters are finishing and putting their bikes away for winter....but not Lakeside Chapter!

However after a few months of relatively dry warm weather the last few weeks has reminded us just how fast the British weather changes; it's definitely time to find those waterproofs, (and for the softer members amongst us heated gloves, jackets and boots!.... I know my heated grips work as they are regularly turned up to max by someone!) so make sure all your wet weather gear is ready for action at short notice. Plus check Facebook and TeamUp as sometimes for safety reasons rides maybe cancelled at short notice. If Amber or Red weather warnings are in place, but where safe to do so the Road Captain will continue with the planned ride.

By the time you read this the Chapter will have four newly trained Road Captains, who I am sure will be of great value to the Chapter leading you to lots of new and interesting destinations over the coming year. As promised prior to their official HOG training in Oxford, I undertook a training afternoon with the four of them and Carl Webb ("thank you" Carl for your time and support) to go through different scenarios and answer any questions they had. Their feedback was very positive, and they agreed it was something we should look to do for all members…so watch out for training dates.

Tips for Riding in the Rain:

Wet weather significantly reduces traction, increasing the risk of accidents. To ride safely in such conditions, consider the following tips:

Ease Off the Gas - Maintaining a steady speed is crucial on wet roads. Avoid sudden acceleration and deceleration. Keep your gear changes and braking smooth.

Increase Your Space – Keep a greater distance between your motorcycle and the vehicle ahead to allow for longer braking distances. This extra space gives you more time to react to sudden stops or changes in traffic.

Avoid the Puddles: Puddles might conceal hazards or cause hydroplaning, where your tyres lose grip on the road. Steer clear of them to reduce the risk of losing control.

Brake Smoothly: Apply both brakes gently and gradually. Abrupt braking can cause your wheels to lock up, resulting in a skid. Remember, smooth actions are key to maintaining control.

Stay Bright: In rainy conditions, visibility is reduced. In addition to headlights being on, wear bright or reflective gear to enhance your visibility to other road users.

Gear Up for Rain: Waterproof gear, including a jacket, pants, and gloves, is essential for staying dry and focused. Additionally, a high-visibility vest ensures you're easily seen by others on the road.

Maintain Your Ride: Regularly check your motorcycle's tyres, brakes, and lights. Proper maintenance is crucial, especially in wet conditions, to ensure optimal performance. The bare minimum for your motorcycle to be roadworthy, inspect the tread wear indicators, tyres must have a minimum tread depth of 1.5mm in all principal grooves.

Keep Calm: If your motorcycle starts to slide, stay calm. Gradually reduce your speed without sudden movements. Look where you want to go and steer gently in that direction to regain control.

Adapt Your Riding Style: In wet conditions, aggressive manoeuvres are risky. Apply throttle, brakes, and lean gently to maintain control. Avoid sudden movements that could lead to a loss of traction.

Plan Ahead: Check the weather forecast before heading out. If possible, avoid riding in heavy rain or storms. Plan your route to avoid areas prone to flooding or with poor drainage.

See Clearly: Rain reduces visibility, so keep your visor clean and use anti-fog treatments. Slow down and scan the road ahead to anticipate hazards.

Double Your Distance: Stopping distances double on wet roads, so increase your following distance to give yourself more time to react to sudden stops or obstacles.

Watch for Oil Spills: After a dry spell, the first rain can make roads slick. Avoid puddles, painted lines, and metal surfaces, as these can be especially slippery.

Master the Brakes: Adjust your braking technique for wet conditions. Apply both brakes progressively, with a slight emphasis on the rear brake for better control.

Tame the Turns: Approach corners with caution on wet roads. Reduce your speed before entering the turn and maintain a more upright body position to maximize tyre contact with the road






LADIES OF HARLEY

Lastly, I was asked to share a Christmas Cake Recipe, and yes that time of year has come around again to start the preparations. I have used this a few times and it make a fantastic Christmas cake indeed! If you have any recipes to share just email me! I hope you enjoy the recipe and send some photos of how you got on!

Classic Christmas cake

Ingredients:

1kg mixed dried fruit (use a mix of raisins, sultanas, currants, cherries, cranberries, prunes or figs) zest and juice 1 orange zest and juice 1 lemon 150ml brandy, Sherry, whisky or rum, plus extra for feeding 250g pack butter, softened 200g light soft brown sugar 175g plain flour 100g ground almond 1 tsp vanilla extract ½ tsp baking powder 2 tsp mixed spice

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp ground cloves

100g flaked almonds

4 large eggs

Method:

STEP 1

Put 1kg mixed dried fruit, the zest and juice of 1 orange and 1 lemon, 150ml brandy or other alcohol, 250g softened butter and 200g light, soft brown sugar in a large pan set over a medium heat.

STEP 2

Bring to the boil, then lower the heat and simmer for 5 mins. Tip the fruit mixture into a large bowl and leave to cool for 30 mins.

STEP 3

Heat oven to 150C/130C fan/gas 2. Line a deep 20cm cake tin with a double layer of baking parchment, then wrap a double layer of newspaper around the outside – tie with string to secure.

STEP 4

Add 175g plain flour, 100g ground almonds, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp baking powder, 2 tsp mixed spice, 1 tsp ground cinnamon, $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp ground cloves, 100g flaked almonds, 4 large eggs and 1 tsp vanilla extract to the fruit mixture and stir well, making sure there are no pockets of flour.

STEP 5

Tip into your prepared tin, level the top with a spatula and bake in the centre of the oven for around 2 hrs. After 2 hrs insert a skewer into the centre of the cake to test if it's done. If any wet cake mixture clings to the skewer, return the cake to the oven for another 10 mins then check again and keep cooking, checking every 10 mins until the skewer comes out dry.

STEP 6

Remove the cake from the oven, poke holes in it with a skewer and spoon over 2 tbsp of your chosen alcohol. Leave the cake to cool completely in the tin.

STEP 7

To store, peel off the baking parchment, and store in a cake tin. Feed the cake with 1-2 tbsp alcohol every fortnight, until you ice it.

STEP 8

Don't feed the cake for the final week to give the surface a chance to dry before icing.



RIDE-OUT GUIDELINES

Chapter activities are conducted primarily for the benefit of H.O.G. Chapter members. There are three categories of activities, identified as follows:

Member Event – (Rallies, Multi-day)

Member Events are events that are only open to Chapter Members or to other HOG Members with approval of a Chapter Primary Officer prior to the event date.

Open Events

Open Events are open to Chapter Members and others. Guests must be approved by a Chapter Primary Officer prior to the event date.

Closed Events

Closed Events are open to Chapter members and one guest per member. Riding guests will need approval of a Chapter Primary Officer prior to the event date.

Chapter Primary Officers

Director, Assistant Director, Treasurer, Secretary.

Guest Policy

Guests are allowed to participate in Member Events if they are a current HOG member and preapproved by a Chapter Primary Officer.

An Open Event Guest is permitted at the discretion of one of the Chapter Primary Officers.

Each Chapter member is permitted to invite 1 guest, per event, to participate and may only have the same guest on 6 occasions in any membership year. If the event is subsidised then the guest will need to pay full cost.

Each guest must sign a Ride Disclaimer and the host Chapter member must take responsibility and must ensure that the guest abides by the Chapter rules.

TUESDAY 3RD SEPTEMBER: TARKA'S CAFE

We started as usual from Starbucks at the Halfway House. The weather wasn't looking too good but that didn't stop the hardened riders.


