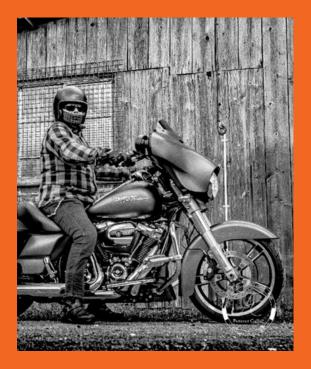

Riding Harleys into Old Age

Let's face it nobody gets any younger! So this month's safety article looks at riding motorcycle's into Older Age... and how you might extend your riding career.

The Road Never Ages.....

Motorcycling defies age. It's not about the number of candles on your birthday cake; it's about the fire within.

As long as your heart races at the thought of twisting roads and open skies, you're never too old to ride.







When considering riding motorcycles into old age, it's essential to recognise that there is no definitive age limit for riding. As long as you maintain your physical and mental capabilities, you can enjoy the thrill of riding at any age.

Here are some key points to keep in mind:

Vision: Clear vision is crucial for safe riding, and age related changes can affect your ability to perceive hazards. If in doubt get to the opticians and wear those glasses if prescribed.

Hearing: Being attuned to engine sounds, traffic, and sirens helps in situational awareness, which is vital for safe riding.

Reflexes: While aging may slow response time, quick reflexes are essential if evasive manoeuvres are required. Stay sharp and ensure you ride within your comfort zone.

Physical Health: Chronic pain, diminishing reflexes, and eyesight can impact riding. Regular exercise and pain management strategies can help. Book your yearly health check-up with your GP: it's always best to catch any issues early.

Safety Equipment: Advanced technology in motorcycles makes them more adaptable for riders of all ages, including those in their 80s, and even 90s. Whilst Harleys are known for being heavy compared to other brands, technology or three wheels can assist.

Safety Precautions: Following the rules of the road and taking necessary safety precautions can ensure a safe riding experience at any age.

Stay Curious: Keep learning about riding techniques and safety, book yourself onto a BikeSafe course. It doesn't matter how long you've been riding and what you think you know, there is always something new to learn or just polish up those skills.

Remember, riding a motorcycle is a hobby that requires attention to safety and wellbeing. But it's also about enjoying the ride, companionship, staying active and living life to the full.

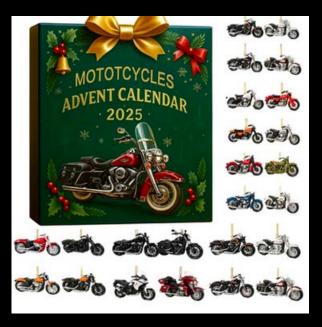

Life on Three Wheels

Our Secretary Neil Searle-Jones tells us why and how he transferred from two wheels to three. It wasn't as easy as you may think and it's not just like riding a bike!

Like all good stories of adventure and daring-do, which this is unfortunately not, it is still probably best to start with the reason why Dee and I ride a trike.

As many of you know Dee had a brain tumour in 2017 and then a cranium plate installed in her head in July 2018. When she had healed we had a couple of trial rides on our Ultra Low in November 2018 to see how she felt about riding as a pillion. The rides were successful and Dee wanted to carry on riding, but both of us decided that the danger of dropping the bike at low speed with the possibility of Dee pitching off and banging her head was quite high and unacceptable. As we both still wanted to ride and stay in the Chapter we opted for a Harley trike. We choose a Freewheeler rather then the Tri-Glide Ultra as the Freewheeler front end is based on a Road King with the seating/riding position, slimline rear structure and lack of the back box more bike like.



This was delivered in March 2019 and the fun began. Riding/triking is totally different from riding a bike or driving a car. An obvious point but hard to get your head around when you are first on it. You have to actually steer it to go round bends rather than using lean angle or counter steering. This made for some entertaining times, if not scary, on our first few trips. As you do not need to lean into corners as on a bike you tend to start by sitting upright so when you do go around a bend you find the centrifugal forces leaning you the wrong way - not too bad for me as I had the bars to hang on to, but for Dee she was sliding slowly off the seat with cries of "help". It took us a couple of rides to realise this and master leaning into the bends to make life easier. Obvious when you think about it but not when you first ride a trike.

The other exciting learning curve we found was to do with braking. When you brake on a bike either going straight or if over egging the speed in a corner you still retain an element of directional choice. Braking on a trike is a straight line process as any braking, hard or gentle, causes the steering to become rigid. In a straight line you cannot turn the bars and in a corner if you need to brake the trikes front wheel tends to straighten. You then find yourself heading into the oncoming lane - not good for a long life or healthy heart. We had an incident on a recent (2025) ride out when I had a senior moment and over egged the front brake on a corner and went straight across the oncoming carriageway. Only the slow speed and quick reaction of the oncoming carriageway driver prevented a nasty accident. You cannot get complacent when triking.

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Braking has become an art form that is quite straight forward when you know the trike's behaviour under braking (excluding senior moments that is). Unfortunately none of the available advice from HD Dealerships when you buy one mentions this, although in the Good Old USA if you buy a Trike you get proper tuition and access to some good On Line videos. As I previously said both of the above are obvious when you have experienced them but they are not intuitive to you on the change from bike to trike. It is probably easier going from car to trike.

After a couple of months and 1,500 miles, including a couple of overeager braking sessions involving oncoming traffic, we both wondered if the change had been a good idea, but as further time went on the riding became more natural and we were even filtering in traffic.

Strangely, the width at the rear was not as much of an issue as I first thought it would be. The Ultra we had was wide with its lower leg shields, highway pegs and large side panniers and the extra width of the trike I found easy to account for.

Although the trike is about 15inches wider then an Ultra /Glide it is a more stable platform and this makes it relatively easy to slow speed filter in lanes of traffic especially if there are cats eyes or poor lane joints. The main disadvantage is on single carriageways where the extra width usually puts you in the oncoming traffic lane.



The trike has grown on us both, the stability especially on damp and wet road surfaces, gravel or unpaved carparks, muddy lanes with grass in the middle and turning around in narrow roads with the removal of the fear of dropping a bike really has made us appreciate it.

They are not for all and you have to be prepared to take some stick but it is usually good natured. However, over the five years, in two Chapters, we have owned a trike we have observed that some of the so called "banter" especially that concerning "macho' elements has deferred riders from trying a trike to the detriment of themselves and their pillions which is a shame.

As the years have progressed we have become fans of the trike as it enables us to continue riding safely and to participate in the full social life of the Chapter. We would recommend it as an alternative to anyone if their health/strength or regular pillion have issues with a bike or they cannot be bothered to get a full bike licence (you can ride a trike on a car licence).

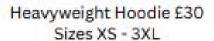

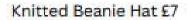

RIDE-OUT GUIDELINES

Chapter activities are conducted primarily for the benefit of H.O.G. Chapter members.

Ride Guest Policy

An Event Guest is permitted at the discretion of one of the Chapter Road Captains.

A Chapter member is permitted to invite one guest per event, to participate and may only have the same guest on six occasions in any membership year. If the event is subsidised then the guest will need to pay full cost.

Each guest must sign a Ride Disclaimer and the host Chapter member must take responsibility and must ensure that the guest abides by the Chapter rules.

WEDNESDAY 10TH SEPTEMBER: TIN ROOF CAFE

With Neil's trike still stuck in the garage by a skip that refused to budge, I took on the ride with a few days notice.

THURSDAY 25TH SEPTEMBER: TARKAS CAFE

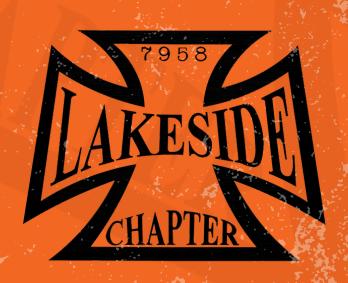

LAKESIDE CHAPTER RIDE AWARDS

Lakeside Chapter operates a **Ride Out Awards Program** based on the number of Official Chapter Rides each Member attends. You must ensure you 'Sign-In' with the Road Captain each time you attend a Ride Out. This helps the RC know the number of Members on each Ride and will be recorded by the Chapter Historian on the Ride Awards Spreadsheet (displayed on the next Page).

Multi-day Rides and Rally's may count for more than one Ride Award. Check with the RC for this.

Ride Award Pin Badges will usually be awarded at Natter Nights for 10, 25, 50, 75, 100 (and so on) for completed Rides.

There is an All Time Total Ride Award Page and a Total Number of Rides completed (so far) this year so you can track your progress.
